

AK T9 Work Diary

Locus 1 commenced 8/5/89 with pick runs through topsoil in producing several smashed blocks, two guttae and a regula northern portion of trench to level with southern portion. A great deal of smashed limestone block with many architectural fragments found, including 9/5/89 T9-11 5/6/22, T9-12 guttae, regulae, a Doric capital and piece of entablature in the north-western

part of the trench, and a pilaster capital on the east side, all three well preserved. Very little pottery but a piece of gypsum discovered in the vicinity of the back wall of the peristyle in the southern portion of the trench.

10/5/89 pick runs continued through topsoil and fill, revealing further architectural fragments and smashed blocks, and, having brought Locus 1 down to the level of Locus 2, pick runs were begun in the latter. Locus 1 was cleared and levels taken for the major blocks. Pick runs in Locus 2 revealed mainly earth fill with

T9-14 few stones and little pottery, except for a lion-headed water spout found at the eastern end. The trench was then planned

11/5/89 The top layer of stones and smashed blocks was cleared from Locus 1 and pick runs continued there, producing fewer small stones and more earth fill with more pottery than before, and also a small quantity of bone at the E end of the trench

13/5/89 After the rest day, pick runs continued in Locus 1 further revealing the rubble of large blocks in the central portion of the trench, including one marked with two lines and another with moulding round two sides. On the eastern side of the trench there were no large blocks only earth fill containing some pottery and a quantity of bone towards the bottom. On the western side of the trench there were large blocks and some pottery with small quantities of charcoal, bone and glass towards the bottom.

T9 14/5/89 Pick runs in the southern portion of Locus 1 were completed producing a little pottery and a small moulded architectural fragment and pick runs then continued in Locus 2 and to define the trench edges in the rubble area producing slightly more pottery, a fragment of bone and some charcoal in the central portion of the Locus. Locus 1 was then photographed and the whole trench planned.

15/5/89 After completion of the trench plan, all the planned large stones were removed from Locus 1 apart from the wall blocks and pick runs continued in the remaining soil including a large pillar



of earth left under T9-5 on the west side. Some pottery, charcoal and bone was produced and a small fragment of white wall plaster with black and red painted lines.

16/5/89 Pick was continued through the last six inches of fill down to the natural limestone (Locus 3) to floor level in the northern part of the trench so as to determine the position of the floor before coming down to floor level over the foundation track of the wall. The fill contained some stones, rather more pottery than before, some pieces of plaster, a piece of gypsum, a bronze coin (?), a ring bezel, and

Three detached-over nails in the north-eastern corner, a ring bezel, and, towards floor level more bone and charcoal, the fill just on top of the floor tending to be slightly blackened. The floor (Locus 3) also produced some pottery lying directly upon it. Approximately two-thirds of the north-eastern part of the trench was brought down to the floor level

17/5/89 Clearing of Floor (Locus 3) including removal of stones on the floor completed & producing bone,

charcoal and some pottery on the floor as well as further iron nails, a The foundation track of the wall was however left intact.

pebble scraper and a bronze coin. Burning including burnt pottery was noted very clearly on the floor in the eastern bank at c. 1m

from the north-east corner of the trench. T9-46 was left on the floor of the trench, Locus 3 was cleaned, and it was then photographed.

18/5/89 Locus 2 was cleaned to floor level and trench T10 was then marked out. Work on T10 was begun with clearance of part

of a rubble spoil heap encroaching on the north-eastern corner

21/5/89 The bank between T9 and T3 to the west was demolished (Locus 4)




① ② △ 8/5/89 limestone architectural fragment

Locus 1 represents the rubber spoil heap in the north-eastern corner of the track





AK T10 Work Diary

18/5/89 Work on T10 commenced with clearance of part of the rubble spoil heap encroaching on the north-eastern corner of the trench (Locus 1). This produced a little pottery. Pick runs were then begun from the northern end of the trench southwards (Locus 2).

20/5/89 Pick runs continued in the northern end of the trench (Locus 2)

T10 [2] [C] [A] revealing a bundle of large stones including an architectural fragment, a piece of glass, but very little pottery
T10 [2] [A] of glass, but very little pottery

21/5/89 Pick runs continued in the northern half of the trench (Locus 2) These






