

Continuing to dig the small trench along the southern wall. It is 130 cm wide, running E-W, parallel to the wall. It seems apparent that there is a floor, a very poor and uneven floor of crushed limestone when viewed in profile. 



The well is now quite clearly defined. The worked stones seem to be set in at floor level: the floor is well preserved in the SW corner, elsewhere just the hard packed mix of small stones remains - in the SW there is some clay on top. The pottery I have

called  labelled as ② ⑩. See scale diagram. We will start to dig in the well itself as much as possible - it is very narrow - rather than dig through the floor around the well. We will also dig the 120cm wide section we left yesterday and maybe try and trace the drain.





The patches are only large stones - some with bones within a wall and a half of the wall. It would seem to be rubble from the wall and that is a considerable amount of soil between the limestone and that rubble, suggesting that a considerable length of time had elapsed.



July 1957. The good news about the new dig is (1) ^{the} ^{discovery} of a piece of painted plaster, about 6 inches from the wall in the NW corner, ^{itself} ^{is} ^{labelled} [3] [3] A.

 The stuff we are digging through is the same hard limestone/soil mix found in these 3 trenches 333/4 + 7 + 8, suggestive of a courtyard.

There are several reasons for thinking this space may be a courtyard:

- i) the composition of the ground level is suggestive of a courtyard: a very hard mixture of limestone, soil and hard-paked clay over a dense mixture of small stones and clay, with the occasional patch - nothing too concentrated - of charcoal.
- ii) the presence of a cistern and drain suggests a courtyard
- iii) the space cleared - the best part of 3 trenches so far - is too huge to be part of internal, unless a wall runs down the back (there is no trouble to suggest this)
- iv) The space prior to excavation, and the space we haven't dug, was very flat and bare with of stones - one wouldn't expect to find much trouble in the centre of ~~such~~ a large courtyard




Today we are cleaning up the drain.
 In the west of the trench the drain is very well preserved, being covered by small flat stones and sealed with plenty of mud - in this place I have exposed the stones + mud sealant alone.
 In the middle of the trench, the stones disappear and the drain was harder to follow. There was still plenty of mud over the drain but it is not as evidently so obviously a covered drain at this point - we removed no stones to expose the drain.
 At the mouth of the cistern, the drain ~~enters~~ entered what looks like a catchment area under a few stones which are shown in the scale diagram. The stones are beautifully sealed with mud and plaster, which is well preserved.




